I joined VAC in my freshman year as a way to stay connected with art during my busy engineering schedule. I loved art before college, having taken an art class every year since 8th grade, and was worried about not having enough time to still have that creative outlet. VAC offered this outlet which blossomed into much more as I became more involved in the leadership and the gallery work. During my sophomore year, I took on the role of Committee Development where I planned all of our general committee meetings, and this year I am gaining more behind the scenes and leadership experience as Chair.

This fall, VAC was hit with a very unexpected change to our financial picture. We knew our status was changing from a departmental MSC Committee to a Registered Student Organization [RSO], but we did not know how that would change our finances. As an RSO, we cannot use any of our MSC funds, or our endowment, to pay for artist travel or hospitality (which impacts our residency program drastically). We had to adjust quickly to this change when we hosted Carol Flueckiger in October.

Another area impacted is our member meetings. The MSC no longer provides funds for our art supplies that we use at our general member meetings. Meeting activities are a source of creativity and community for our members, and it's often what draws them in to higher leadership roles.

<u>As we manage these changes, we are</u> <u>learning to fundraise more, but it's a steep</u> <u>learning curve. We continue to seek</u> <u>support from former members like you!</u>


PRACTICE WHAT WE TEACH

MEMBERS OF THE MSC VISUAL ARTS COMMITTEE STRONGLY BELIEVE ART EDUCATION PLAYS A PIVOTAL ROLE IN SHAPING WELL-ROUNDED, ADAPTABLE, AND CULTURALLY AWARE INDIVIDUALS. THIS SUMMER, MSC VAC WAS PROUD TO SHOWCASE ART EDUCATORS IN THE BRAZOS VALLEY BY DISPLAYING THEIR ARTWORK. THROUGH THIS EXHIBIT, WE WERE ABLE TO EMPHASIZE THE IMPORTANCE OF ART EDUCATORS WHO ARE SO BUSY WITH STUDENTS AND THE DEMANDS OF TEACHING THAT THEY OFTEN DON'T HAVE TIME TO PRACTICE THEIR OWN CREATIVE ENDEAVORS.

PRACTICE WHAT WE TEACH DISPLAYED A TOTAL OF 18 ARTISTS FROM 6 DIFFERENT SCHOOL DISTRICTS, 4 PRIVATE SCHOOLS AND 1 COMMUNITY ART CENTER. ONE OF THE ARTISTS WAS A FORMER MSC VAC MEMBER, CLOVER COCHRAN, WHO WAS INVOLVED IN VAC IN THE 90S. HER BRONZE SCULPTURES WERE A HIGHLIGHT OF THE EXHIBIT. EACH OF HER THREE SCULPTURES REPRESENTED A DIFFERENT DIRECTION SHE CHOSE IN THE COURSE OF HER ART CAREER. HER SCULPTURES INCORPORATE THE SOUL AND HISTORY OF BRAZOS VALLEY BY SMALL DETAILS FROM TRAINS. THEY PAY HOMAGE TO THE SOUNDS HISTORY OF THE BRAZOS VALLEY SO MANY AGGIES REMEMBER.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Carol Flueckiger is a mixed-media artist whose work delves into feminist history, weather, and geography. Her signature technique builds on cyanotype, a light sensitive chemical she blends with drawing and painting. Flueckiger teaches at the School of Art at Texas Tech University, and the Charles Adams Gallery in Lubbock, Texas, represents her work. Her research draws from institutions such as the Library of Congress, the American Antiquarian Society, Women's Rights National Historical Park, Freedom Solar Corporation, and Solar Energy International. Flueckiger holds a BFA in Painting and Drawing from the University of Minnesota and an MFA in Painting from the University of New Mexico.



WORKSHOP WITH THE ARTIST

MSC VAC and Flueckiger hosted a workshop in October that involved using a drip painting technique, continuous line drawings, and filling in negative spaces. It was centered on one of her art and research areas: sustainability and environmental awareness. One of her biggest influences is the conservation of the Ogallala Aquifer in the panhandle region of West Texas.

Using water as the primary medium, the attendees painted their "drips" and then added paint to those strokes to see their art come to life with color! The artists were then invited to attend an informal reception with Carol and other guests! These short residency programs are an important aspect of VAC's mission at Texas A&M University!

WHAT HAVE YOU ENJOYED MOST?


